- Students who want to reflect on the major questions outlined above without treating secular modernity as a clean break with the past

WHAT MAKES RELIGION STAND OUT AS A SEQUENCE?

- Considers how the social sciences are constituted in conversation and in a struggle with the religious traditions from which they emerged
- Shows how many of our human questions about why we're here, why we suffer, and how we can make the world better remain the same across time and space, even as the answers differ radically
- Focuses on how religious history and ideals continue to pervade the social world in all of its manifestations
